
television - Seven Brides for Seven Brothers, The Sound of Music and Mary Poppins!

Owned by Rhodium Arabians on New Zealand's North Island, this superb grey stallion is siring excellent stock and the terrific Stuart Vesty photographs made for a brilliant front cover for our World Edition.

One of the main features in this edition was on QR Marc (Marwan Al Shaqab x Swete Dreams by Magic Dream

> CAHR out of Kouream de Ment), a stallion that had gone World Champion in Paris the month before. It is no secret that I am a huge fan of QR Marc, and I also very much enjoy writing in-depth features. So it was a treat for me to be able to write about this stallion

and his achievements, as well as those of his offspring, in depth.

QR Marc

The Qatar International Show is very relaxed and has been known to feature some of the greats of the industry including, very memorably one year, Al Adeed Al Shaqab (Ansata Halim Shah x Sundar Alisayyah by Ruminaja Ali out of Imperial Sayyah). It was also good to meet Val Bunting of Esteem Bloodstock, who I have conversed with for many years. I also met Dr Michael Kersebaum and his wife, Susanne; Michael is the Chairman of VZAP, the German Stud Registry and the organisers of the All Nations' Cup and German National Championships. A fun night was spent with them, American Michael Fischer, who works in the American racing industry, Jan



and Eveline Calis of the Netherlands, celebrating England's win in the Six Nations Rugby over France. There are many optional visits and excursions arranged for visitors to the Qatar Festival, and two stud visits stood out, one being to the famed Al Shaqab Stud, part of the Qatar Foundation, where everyone enjoyed a wonderful

evening. However, it was the trip to Al Shahania Stud that captivated me the most. Set in beautiful surroundings, located outside of Doha, Al Shahania is a wonderful mix of racing and showing bloodlines, and it was lovely to spend a relaxed morning strolling around the farm before brunch. Some people even took advantage of the camel rides, although I chose to sit and talk to the international guests.

I had one very special experience with Al Shahania Stud, as during the racing that was to follow, they held a dinner for special friends and guests of the farm. I was lucky enough to be invited along by Manager Alexandra Newman, and the event took place outside a hotel, down by the waters of the Arabian Gulf. With Doha lit up in the background, and the moonlight sparkling on the water, it really was a very special evening; thank you.

The Festival is also part of the very exciting race meetings that take place in late February. Held over three days, the meet culminates in the HH The Emir Sword Group 1 Race, held over 2,400m. With Lisa Deymonaz from Al Shahania having patiently explained everything that there was to know about Arabian racing to me, I watched the meets with a new interest. The winner was Tabarak (Nizam x Altesse Daroco by Manganate out of Asbaa Daroco), owned and bred by Umm Qarn, and it really was a thrilling finish. Preceding the racing was

a very enjoyable gala dinner, and it was interesting to spend time with a different group of people where performance, rather than beauty, was the main focus.

Having enjoyed a wonderful BBQ party that night with friends, our last day, the Saturday, and now into March, was spent relaxing by the pool. Here, I spent some time with Amanda Smith, Racing Manager at ARO (Arabian Racing Organisation). March - emotional reunions




For once, this year, I was home on Mothering Sunday and able to show

I vowed that I wouldn't see 'Alfie' before his class but, as his was towards the end and the classes were taking so long, I went round to the stables. I stood there, in front of him, and said "Alfie" several times — and after a moment or two, his expression changed; he remembered me, even though I haven't seen him since 2007. I cried, again; this was an emotional trip to the Middle East!

Alfie showed well in his class and just missed out on the Top Five, having been Reserve Champion here in 2011. I went to the collecting ring afterwards and had some photographs taken with him; I think my face says all that you need to know about how it felt to be reunited with one of our homebreds again!

The ethereal Emandoria (Gazal Al Shaqab x Emanda by Ecaho out of Emanacja) was one of the big winners here, along with two super yearling colts by Maraji. Both bred by Al Hawajer Stud in the UAE, Bad'e Al Hawajer (ex Valentyna F by Psytadel out of Veronia by Abakan), now owned by Al Muawd Stud, took Gold while Nashmi Al Hawajer (ex Maniba Bint Ibn Narav by Ibn Narav out of Marena by Kubinec) stood Silver. Two very smart colts.

The show ended on the Saturday early in the evening, and I dined with Christine Jamar. Sadly, I would wake at 5am and spend the next 11

to attend, and farms to write about, it is impossible to stick to the same schedule every year. However, it did feel good to land back in Abu Dhabi Airport once more and step out into the sultry night.

Renea by El Sher-Mann out of Renea) returned to the American showring once more. The cheers as this stallion came in could have raised the roof, and he won his class in style. However,




in the championships, it was the young Polish stallion Pogrom (QR Marc x Petla by Pepton out of Pestka) that would take the Gold title with the 14-year-old Justice in Silver. However, WH Justice's lease to Aljassimya Farm has been very successful and the foals that have been

born there show much promise. The full Vegas report was featured in the June edition of *The Arabian Magazine*.

I flew into Vegas a day early in order to spend some time with the

international judge, Allan Preston from Australia. Since first meeting Allan in Aachen a few years ago, he and I have become close friends and it was lovely to be able to spend some time with him and catch up with life Down Under. That evening, I spent time with Anna Bishop, Executive Director of The Pyramid Society. Anna and her team work tirelessly to promote the Egyptian Arabian, culminating in the annual US Egyptian Event, held every June. I was privileged to see a preview of the whole series as it stood then, and it was just breathtaking. This year, having gone on to travel around the United States in previous years, I headed straight for home once the show was over. all disciplines. It was also good


to walk the paddocks and see the Peakland Arabians; there were a couple I would have liked to take home with me in my car!

ROE Laheeb (Essteem x ZT Ludjbrosiaa by Ludjin el Jamaal out of ZT Shabrosiaa) impresses me more each time I see him. Now 11 years old, this bay stallion is woefully underused, and with his classical lines, combining Ali Jamaal, El Shaklan, and Bey Shah, he really has a lot of potential for breeders.



Returning home once more, I enjoyed a family anniversary before beginning work on the June edition. The theme for this edition was, as usual, Crabbet/Russian, and the Crabbet community had much to look forward to this summer as a World Crabbet Convention was taking place here in the UK. But more on that later!

Our cover horse this time was the very impressive, and I think unbeaten, EKS Alihandro (Marwan Al Shaqab x OFW Psylhouette by Padrons Psyche

out of Hafati Julianna). This three-year-old colt, bred in South Africa by Willie Brown, and owned by the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's Athbah Stud, has won around the world and is currently on course to take the Junior Male World Championship title. EKS Alihandro truly is a show horse and he deservedly has a legion of fans, all more than ready to

Just how an Arabian horse should be – versatile and willing to give each time, TF Prince de Beers certainly earned his colours that day!

Leaving the sultry and hot south of France, we arrived back to grey skies and cooler weather, and I returned home to meet Saachi Gold.




He proved to be a very smart and showy chestnut colt, more so than his maternal half-sibling, which is saying something, and we look forward to having some fun with him in 2014.

July - World Crabbet Convention

So – the July edition! The cover for this issue was just stunning, and has to be one of my favourites from the year. Glenn Jacobs beautifully



captured the stallion, Marajj, and my in-depth feature on the horse ran in this edition. I also included my trip to Peakland Arabians and Ffatal Attraction, and this issue had a great response.

The focus, for us, was then on the World Crabbet Convention. Organised by the Crabbet Committee here in the UK, the Convention was held from 19-21 July, with stud visits starting on Monday 22 July. A host of international visitors from across Europe, the USA, and







Australasia came to the Convention and it really was a great weekend. The Parade, held on the Saturday, was enlightening in terms of seeing the Crabbet horses here in this country, while Sunday's Conference was extremely interesting. On a personal note, it was lovely to have Rosaliah Gold's maternal half-sister, Saraphina Sunset (by Grecian Idyll by Silvern Idyll out of Grecian Gilt by General Gold) make her show-ring debut as part of the General Gold family group, and we hope to bring her out again in 2014. A full report of the Convention was run in the September edition, while the tours were featured in the October issue.

The two stud visits on the Monday – to Gadebrook Stud and Moonlight Arabians – will forever be remembered as the day the future King of England, HRH Prince George, was born. It made the

Crabbet Convention even more of a celebration, and the atmosphere for the rest of the tour remained buoyant.

From there, we arrived back home on that Monday evening and had just one day to pack everything up before we headed to the British



National Championships on Wednesday. *The Arabian Magazine* tradestand was there once more, capably run by Bec, and it was lovely to catch up with so many of you at the show.

The deluge that followed was intense and unrelenting. I felt so sorry for the poor mares, some of whom had foals at foot, that were waiting to come in for final judging. I also felt sorry for Bec, my dad and I, as we had to finish loading up the tradestand into the van in the downpour! One stiff cup of tea later, and having seen Designed secure the Gold Stallion Championship, we made our way back to Norfolk. The journey, I have to say, was horrible and I had to stop several times to let the rain die down a little. It amazed me that, in the dark gloom and with virtually zero visibility, there were still drivers without their lights on!

Having made it home safely, our attention turned back to the Crabbet Convention Tours once more, and mum and I made a quick trip to Alexia Ross's Zobeyni Stud to see her beautiful collection of Arabians. Her yearling colt, Zobeyni Nurani (Grecian Idyll x Narishka by Ranadi out of Nafranta) easily stole the show. Alexia has cleverly been able to breed a straight Crabbet bay, and Nurani loved to show off in front of the group of visitors. He will be one to watch, for sure.

Also this month, it was lovely to catch up locally with Louise Clark, who used to work for the late Eileen Tatam at her Sutton Hall Stud. Louise and I spent many a summer at Malvern, talking horses – and boys – and it was lovely to spend some time with her and talk about our plans, and dreams, for the future. Naturally, the evening revolved all around the horses once more, and it really was fun to reminisce about time gone by.


Once again, I was home

His work, Arab Mare was, to my


mind, captivating, and it was an honour to be able to present him with his award later that day.




as I enjoy writing and researching them.
