January

I spent a wonderful Christmas break with family and friends and on 3 January, it was time to head back into the office and start planning


work there. Sean had made a visit to the UK over the





Shahh x Simeon Setavi by Simeon Sadik), a seven-year-old stallion that has proven to be a wonderful foundation stallion for the then-revitalised Rhodium Arabians. The Saraaf daughters at the farm have all gone on to excel and are now being crossed with the stud's superstar sires, Rajah KA (Makhnificent KA x Rahimah KA) and Ansata Nile Pharaoh (Ansata



Iemhotep x Ansata Misty Nile). Exciting times

lie ahead for this stud and they are well worth the visit. Their story appeared in the March edition of *The Arabian Magazine*. From there, I went on to visit Gerzanne Stud, found in Te Puke, kiwi country. The stud celebrated 45 years of breeding in 2012 and is owned and founded by Sue Spratt, and run with her good friend Bev Jones. some beautiful images of the seascape.



On Monday, I was dropped at Sydney airport as the East Coast Championships judge Joe Polo arrived and from there, I flew up to Taree in possibly the smallest plane I have ever been on! My destination was Eagleridge Arabians, owned by Jenni and Paul Ogden, and Jenni was there to meet me.

Flooding is something that affects their farm greatly and just two days before, the stables had been flooded. Arriving at Firefly – a place I have always wanted to visit if just for the name – it was something of a relief to see that the waters had descended.

I finally got to meet a stallion I have wanted to see for years: Afrikah ERA (Sanadik El Shaklan x Arabian Park Egyptian Echo), and he did not disappoint. Handsome, exotic, good-natured, correct, he is all that many of us want in a stallion and it was wonderful to have finally met this gorgeous boy.

Gloria Lanigan currently lives with Jenni and it was great to be able to

spend some time with this fascinating lady as well as meet Colleen Jackson, a breeder from Western Australia. The presentation of Eagleridge Arabians the following morning was very enjoyable and there is real depth to Jenni's programme.

Trish, however, had a treat lined up for me and after a glass of sparkling shiraz — it has to be tried to be believed — she took me out into the Aussie bush for a ride on her straight Egyptian mare Suraya Al Saba (Thaqib Al Nasser x Ses Bint Fabo), the first of Thaqib's children born in Australia. This was the first time I had been horse-riding for 12 years and I thoroughly loved every moment of it — thank you Trish so much for reminding me just what I've been missing all these years! And thanks again to you and Rick for a great evening.

The next day, Trish and her daughter Haley dropped me at Mulawa Stud



for a wonderful few hours wandering quietly among the horses with Scott Benjamin. Karmaa (Kaborr x AN Marieta) is a 1986 mare and is so ethereal. Of all the horses at Mulawa, Karmaa is permanently on my

happened in more places around the world. These classes easily had over 20 horses in each and it was quite nail-biting at times. EBL Juliett (Jive Magic x Stirling Scarlett) and Phantom Menace (Gumbanero x Roc) were two derivatives that really stood out for me, with EBL Juliett also taking a staring role in the halter classes. Australia really does do 'Anglo and part-bred' Arabians well and all really were a joy to watch. Mention must also be made here of the super-talented artist, Tara Brown,

who I admire tremendously. I must confess that for the first three hours at the show, Tara and I just stood and chatted, admired the horses, looked at her latest works, and then said a reluctant goodbye. Tara is always wonderful and a very inspirational artist.

The day after the championships ended, we had two visits scheduled to Simeon Stud for a private display and then to Saba Arabians for their presentation. 
enjoy an afternoon with Glenn, Louise,

Deb, Jennifer, Joe, Trish, Haley and Dianna De Silva, of Rothbury Park Arabians, home of the black stallion Sobek (Asfour x Harts on Fire), and David Marshall of Holly Farm NZ in New Zealand's South Island. Amazingly, the sun came out just long enough for the arena to dry enough that, as the sun began to set, we lit the torches around the arena and enjoyed a mini-presentation of some of Saba's best.

To pick out just one horse is difficult, but I never tire of seeing Thaqib Al Nasser (Ansata Halim Shah x Imperial Madanah) and this desert-like straight Egyptian stallion has truly stamped his mark on their breeding programme. He is always the perfect ending, although Louise did take me quietly to see Orashan's (Messaoud x Ora) last son, Orion Al Saba (ex J'adore Madinah) as a small treat for me as I loved that late, great stallion so much.

Fairview Arabians was my next stop, for dinner the following night, and again torrential rain marked our journey, so much so that Deb had to pull over and stop driving at one point. This is a very poignant


18 February, I landed on the Sunday – straight into the March deadline!

The theme of the March edition was the Egyptian Arabian and Rajah KA, owned by Rhodium Stud, was the cover horse. competitive appearance at the show, a heart-stopping moment as the competition was so fierce. Her many admirers need not have worried, however, as she won in style and claimed her Gold Championships title, a title that ensured she remained unbeaten in all her years of showing and it was wonderful to see.

Another highlight of the show was QR Marc (Marwan Al Shaqab x Swete Dreams) taking his second Gold title of the year, the first being at the Abu Dhabi International Arabian Horse Championships. With Paris around the corner as I write this, QR Marc goes into the show as

All Nations' Cup Gold Champion Stallion and he is tipped to add the elusive world title to his ever-growing collection.

Part of my desire to go to Dubai was thanks to Sheikh Ammar Bin



With the show finishing on the Saturday evening with the championships, I made my way to a different hotel to watch the last of the Six Nations' Rugby Football Union matches with friends and then caught the red-eye flight back to Heathrow. It would have been lovely to stay for the Sunday and attend the Dubai Stud's annual open day, and see QR Mare in his

was just incredible.



#### April

Tuesday 2 May marked the next deadline for *The Arabian Magazine* and this was our first black edition. The three-year-old colt Magic Magnifique (True Colours x Magic Mon Amour) was the cover star, as photographed by Gregor Aymar, and he proved to be a popular choice.

I managed to sneak a visit to our local group show in early April so that I could see my parents' ridden mare make her first outing of the season. Psyanara (Psynergy



x Martina Nareena) duly worther class and went Reserve Open Ridden Champion as well as Reserve Supreme Ridden Champion. It was lovely to catch up with friends at our local group and enjoy seeing the progeny of horses that I have grown up with compete in the ring.

With Jayne helping look after me, and a steady stream of hot


honey and lemon, I made it through the show. On the first morning, we went to the stables to see Freya and as I looked over the door at her, all I could say was 'wow'. This filly really is something special and she went Reserve Champion in her very competitive section, unlucky not to win, and was Supreme Top Ten. Congratulations again Jayne!

The highlight of the show, however, had to be Eden C

(Enzo x Silken Sable). I have seen this chestnut seven-year-old stallion show many times across Europe and the Middle East but never have I seen him show like he did here. With his well deserved 20s in movement, he won the class and also the title of Gold Champion Stallion. What a moment!

Having dined with Sue, Emrys and Rod Jones of Bychan Arabians,





as well as Ed Houghton of Thirteen Oaks Arabians, on the Sunday night, I left Las Vegas on the Monday morning to head to Dallas, Texas. There, my dear friend Julia Turner would meet me for a couple of days of girly time before we would head south to Houston and see the wonderful horses of Michael Byatt Arabians.

Julia and I met in Poland in 2009 and have remained firm friends ever since. The beauty of the Arabian industry is that it allows us to make friends the world over so that we never feel too far away from home. Julia specialises in English

There was one horse I was keen to see while at Michael's, the hot new



Rohara Arabians also has a great team around it and we went into the local town of Ocala on the


my subsequent article would become, at that moment in time, the longest feature I had ever written. Also found in the June edition, the Rohara story is one well worth reading.


Tuesday 1 May saw me load up my cases again, say a heartfelt farewell to all at Hennessey, and head to






and this really is a lovely part of the world to explore.





The Egyptian Event Europe is one of the best run shows I have been




#### October

Wednesday morning saw me drive up through the breathtakingly beautiful Brecon Beacons to Vlacq




